Response Essays

Students are required to complete a series of 4 short essays of 2-3 pages each in which they explore that week's reading in greater detail. Response papers are to be written about the readings in advance of classroom discussion. These essays should advance an argument about the text. These four essays are to be written at your discretion throughout the semester, however, only one paper can be submitted at a time. Marked out of 5; handed in at the beginning of the first class of the week. These assignments will receive brief, targeted feedback. At least one Response must be submitted prior to Thanksgiving.

Essay 1

Students are expected to write a thesis-driven essay responding to one of the prompts provided. The paper should respond thoughtfully to the prompt, fully addressing the question being asked, while still demonstrating the student's ability to think both critically and innovatively. Students are NOT to make use of any text not specifically mentioned in the prompt they are answering; failure to follow this instruction may result in a failing grade. The paper is expected to be fully and accurately cited according to the rules of the most recent edition of the MLA Style Guide and conform to this course's Standards for Written Assignments. Additionally, students are expected to attach this assignment's rubric to the end of their paper when they submit. For additional guidance and eligible prompts, please refer to the assignment sheet provided.

Research Essay

You will be expected to write a detailed, well researched, thesis driven essay on a text or texts from the course. This essay should demonstrate your mastery of the text(s), your ability to effectively integrate your research into your writing, a familiarity with the current critical discourses surrounding your topic, and your ability to write at the university level. No paper that has not received approval at the proposal stage will be accepted for grading. Final Essay 6-8 pages.

Proposal

You will write a proposal where you will articulate what they intend to write about for your Research Essay and how you intend to go about it (this should include a sense of what your thesis will end up being). The proposal also includes an annotated bibliography in which you list no less than five good secondary sources with annotations indicating what they are and why they are useful to your project. This assignment will conform to MLA guidelines for research papers. Your proposal is subject to my approval; no essay that has not received my approval at the proposal stage will be accepted for grading. Proposal: 2pgs + Annotated Bibliography.

Late Policy

Late work will only be accepted until 3pm on the second day following the due date and it will be penalized at a rate of 10%/Day. If work is not submitted by 3pm on the second day following the due date, it will not be accepted and the student will receive a 0(zero) on the assignment. It should also be noted that late material will receive no feedback from the instructor. It is your responsibility to meet the due dates for the assigned material.

Standards for Written Assignments

Learning how to follow house style sheets is one of the most important skills a writer can develop. To aid you in your quest to learn these skills I have provided a document entitled "Standards for Written Assignments" on Moodle. If your paper does not conform to these standards, expect to lose marks.

All work must be TYPED, double spaced, and have proper MLA documentation (unless instructed otherwise). Do NOT submit work to me by e-mail. All work must be submitted through the appropriate dropbox on moodle by the due date. For major assignments, you will be expected to also submit a paper copy to the instructor at the beginning of class on the due date. Please also understand that digital submission of the work will be treated as acknowledgement that the work is free from plagiarism and other forms of academic misconduct and that the work being submitted is in full compliance with Keyano College's Academic Policy and Procedure.

Sensitivity, Respect, and Subject Matter

Some of the material we will be covering this semester is of a charged nature—whether in terms of form, content or politics. As critics, we cannot shy away from this material; however, we must understand that this material may generate a wide variety of reactions and opinions among our colleagues in the classroom.
