This course provides an introduction to the short story by tracing the development of the genre and critically analyzing a substantial number of short stories. The emphasis will be upon a detailed examination of short stories by acknowledged masters of the form: Poe, Hawthorne, Maupassant, Chekhov, James, Joyce and others.

Please, see the suggested topics for your mid-term and term paper below. You will need a minimum of **3**-**4 academic references/sources (books and journals)**. Make sure you follow **MLA guidelines** because you will be marked on the **style** and **structure** of your essay.

Suggested Topics for Mid-term and Final Papers (You can also come up with your topic and discuss it with your instructor for approval):

- 1. Analyze the theme of identity in Margaret Atwood's Happy Endings,
- 2. Investigate the aspects of allegory and symbolism in D. H. Lawrence's *The Rocking-Horse Winner,*
- 3. Explore characterization and structure in James Baldwin's *Sonny's Blues OR* James Joyce's *Araby*,
- 4. Examine the depiction of woman/women in Alice Walker's Everyday Use,
- 5. Discuss the themes of physical courage and death in Yukio Mishima's Patriotism,
- 6. Explore the themes of nihilism and existentialism (death, depression, futility and meaninglessness) in Ernest Hemingway's A Clean Well-Lighted Place,
- 7. Investigate the themes of humour and irony in Mark Twain's Cannibalism in the Cars,
- 8. Choose an open-ended short story and compare it with a close-ended one. What similarities and differences can you enumerate and argue?
- 9. Choose a short story in consultation with your instructor and discuss the major elements in the chosen short story (plot/structure, characterization, theme, point of view, etc.),
- 10. Investigate some of the major themes e.g., 'insanity versus rationality,' 'obsession,' 'the double self,' 'man's relationship with death,' 'love and hate,' 'curiosity,' 'the power of human resolve' in Edgar Allan Poe, who is viewed as the father of the American short story. Give examples and present your argument from a valid and academic theoretical framework.
