In-Class Assignments (10%) - throughout the semester

Each week there will be an in-class assignment to gauge your progress in understanding the course material. Assignments will only be presented in class and will vary each class, meaning you need to attend each class to ensure you don't miss an assignment.

*Unless you have contacted me before class, informing me of the reason you will not be attending class, you will not be able to make up an assignment.

Cold Case File (10%) - throughout the semester

In a task force, you will be presented with a cold case to solve. However, not only do you need to solve the case, but you will apply criminological concepts and perspectives as well. Task force members will present their cold case file during the final week of class. Further instructions will be provided in class and on Moodle.

Crime Log (20%) - Bi-weekly

The purpose of the crime log is to help you organize your ideas on key concepts and demonstrate your engagement with the material. The goal is for you to apply a criminological perspective to the world around you. You are required to make a crime log entry every second week. Crime log entries will be due Sunday at 11:59pm.

Midterm Exam (25%) - Week 6

The midterm will take place during week six and will consist of be a mixture of multiple choice, true and false and short essay questions that cover the first six weeks of material. A study guide will be made available a week before the midterm exam.

Final Exam (35%) - Finals Week

The final exam will take place during finals week and be a mixture of multiple choice and short essay question, each section carries the same weighting. The final exam will cover materials presented throughout the entire course. A study guide will be made available a week before the final exam and a review session will take place the week prior to the exam.
