Assignment Descriptions

1. Community Reflection (10%)

Write a 500-1000 word (1-2 pages double spaced) reflection paper that allows you to explore who you are as a person already rich with personal qualities, background and interests as well as current and past community and service experiences.

Consider:

• What makes up my community/communities? What is citizenship to me?

- What is my experience with community engagement and citizenship? To which communities do you currently belong? Are there communities you could belong to but choose not to? How do you contribute to your community? Why?
- What "service" means to you. When have you been of service to others? In what ways? When have you been served by others? In what ways? What did you give to others when you were providing service? What did you gain from your service experience?
- What do you think and feel about them as a result of having been involved in them?
 What communication, critical thinking or other new skills did you develop as a result?
 How will your experiences prepare you for this current community -based service learning opportunity?

The reflections paper should follow APA 6.0 format. References are not required unless you utilize a source. You will need a title page, an introduction, a body, and a conclusion. Your writing needs to be clear, concise, and succinct in delivery of your ideas.

Please include the word count of your paper on the title page.

2. Windshield Survey (15%)

A windshield survey is an "observational method used as part of a community assessment that scans the community's physical environment" (Stanhope, Lancaster, Jakubec, & Pike-MacDonald, 2014).

Using the Windshield/Walking Survey template in Chapter 9 (Fig. 9.1) of Stanhope et al. (2014) complete a comprehensive windshield survey of your neighborhood.

- Please provide a detailed survey analysis and rational for your findings.
- Indicate whether or not this finding was expected and its consequences on the community, whether positive or negative.

You may use a chart format followed by a summary/conclusion paragraph of your findings.

3. Family Support and Home Hazard Assessment and Care Plan – Sentinel World Virtual Simulation (20%)

- Login to your Healthcare Learning Innovations portal using instructions sent to you by the instructor. There are two sections to complete: Family Support Assessment and Home Hazzard Assessment.
- Click on the Family Support Assessment first and complete the assignment. You must click submit to move on to next section.
- After completion of the Family Support Assessment, complete the Home Hazzard Assessment.

4. Final Reflection (20%) – Minimum 3 pages/Maximum 5 pages

- Choose and reflect on a crisis scenario that mobilizes community resources (ie-wildfire, pandemic, mass shooting, flood etc.)
- Describe the scenario and the involvement of the different community resources (ie-Public and Population Health, acute care, government, agencies etc.)
- What are the different levels of impact?

• What are the health promotion tools that can be utilized to prevent this crisis from happening and/or assist in management of the crisis?

Incorporate learnings from the 122 course and draw on any other courses you may have taken (222). This paper must be written in a scholarly fashion using APA 6.0 and must include title page and references.

5. Final Exam (25%)

A comprehensive invigilated examination on contents of the entire course. Questions may be multiple choice, short answer, fill-in-the-blank, or true/false. The use of Respondus and Lockdown Browser is mandatory.

6. Participation (10%)

Complete the weekly open book, adaptive quizzes on Elsevier or Moodle. The amount of questions you receive will depend on how you answer the previous question (NCLEX style). Each week is worth 2%.

Using LockDown Browser and Respondus for Online Exams

This course requires the use of LockDown Browser for online exams. Watch this <u>short video</u> to get a basic understanding of LockDown Browser and the optional webcam feature (which may be required for some exams).
