Calendar statement

NURS 222 (*3) This course is offered in response to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action, and is the beginning step to culturally safe interaction and practice. Focus is on introducing students to a variety of historical realities and contemporary issues relevant to Indigenous health in Canada. Students will examine issues and contributions facing settler relations from a historical, contemporary and critical perspective, with a focus on health and well-being. Note: Available only to nursing students in the Collaborative Program.

Course hours

Lecture: 6hrs/week over 6 weeks

1. Understand the historical and contemporary realities relevant to Indigenous health in Canada.
2. Develop self-awareness about Indigenous peoples relationship to colonialism and its impacts.

4. Develop and explore cultural humility.
5. Develop an understanding of Indigenous teachings and practices through interactions with Indigenous knowledge keepers and elders.
6. Reflect and critically analyze perceptions and knowledge through / in Indigenous worldviews.

Assignments descriptions

1) Reflections:

- There are four reflections for you to complete during this course.
- Each reflection should be no more than 3 pages long with a minimum of 2 pages.
- Submission is via email or hardcopy by 10 pm on the due dates.

Reflection is an important nursing skill and there are many ways to reflect. In these reflective writing pieces you are asked to use three reflective prompts/questions to guide your reflection. The following are three guiding reflective prompts/questions that you will use to explore your own thoughts, feelings, and experiences surrounding Indigenous health in Canada. There are no right or wrong responses and you will not be judged on what you share. Please allow yourself time to think about each question before answering. The goal of the reflections are for you to reflect on your own thoughts, feelings and experiences and consider how this learning will change your nursing practice.

1. What hesitations/questions/interests did you have while reading, listening or participating in and why do you think these were present (i.e. personal experience, media, family, stigma etc...)
2. How have your thoughts about Indigenous health in Canada changed after reading, listening to or participating in ?
3. What did I learn from this activity? Why is this important to my nursing practice?

2) Digital Presentation:

Presentation (30%)

As part of the class requirements you will be placed in a randomized group to create and present your digital presentation using either a research poster or electronic poster, photovoice, video or powerpoint on an issue relevant to Indigenous health in Canada. Your presentation may address any number of different issues as long as they fall within the concepts discussed throughout the course. One of the areas of Awareness, Acknowledgement, Atonement, or Action should be considered and linked to your presentation. Your presentation will include the following:

- a. **Proposal** – The proposal will be one page in length. The purpose of the proposal is to provide a clear concise description of the topic or issue your presentation will address.

- b. **Presentation** – The 15 minute (marks will be docked if you exceed your time limit) presentation must demonstrate your group’s ability to integrate relevant resource materials (eg., photographs, graphs, brochures, literature, etc) to engage your audience and have them develop a deeper understanding of your topic/issue. The presentation will be evaluated for content, presentation and creativity.
- c. **Peer Assessment** – Members of your group will have the opportunity to evaluate team members. You will be able to provide feedback and rate your peer’s efforts.

Marking guide is provided on moodle.

3) Final Examination (30%) The final exam will consist of 75 multiple choice questions. This exam will cover material from the entire course.

Final grades

The assignments are marked as raw scores according to the percentage weight assigned to each. The marks on course assignments will contribute to the overall letter grade according to the percentage that each assignment is weighted in the course. At the end of the course, all assignment scores are totaled for a term summary mark in the course based on the grading scale below. The FINAL COURSE GRADE is based on the cumulative total of individual student’s weighted assignment marks.
