Note that ENGL 103 has NO final exam. The final grade is based entirely upon course work. Your participation grade will depend upon several factors: being prepared for class by reading the assigned work in advance and bringing the required book(s) to class; making useful contributions to discussions and in-class group activities; completing in-class responses, minute papers, quizzes, and other informal assignments; and being a co-operative, engaged, and supportive member of the learning community.

Assignments must be submitted on the due date, which is always a Tuesday. Assignments handed in on Wednesday will be graded without additional comments and will also lose 10% up to 3 p.m., when they will be REFUSED. NO assignments will be accepted after 3 p.m. on Wednesday. Extensions will NOT be granted except under circumstances of bereavement or serious illness. Computer or printer failure is seldom an acceptable reason for granting an extension, and a conflict of deadlines is NEVER an acceptable reason.

Assignments must be typed in 12-pt Times New Roman, double spaced, and submitted with proper MLA documentation. Do NOT submit assignments to me by e-mail or through Moodle. It is always preferable to hand an assignment to me directly. Be sure to keep a copy of anything that you hand in.

Full guidelines for submission are in the course pack, and additional requirements will be detailed on each assignment sheet.

Students who do not complete all the required work will not pass the course.
