ENGL 289A: Children's Literature in English

3 credits, 3 hours lecture

This three-credit senior English course will trace the history of children's literature and explore its evolution from didacticism to delight. A survey of its rich variety will include analysis of animal stories, literary fantasy, adventure, and realism. Through the study of classic and contemporary works, students will develop an understanding of literary theory and criticism.

Throughout the course, you will respond to 10 of the 12 prompts posted on the Moodle forum, posting your own reply and commenting on the response of at least one other student. Your own response should be a coherent paragraph (between 5 and 8 sentences) and show your understanding of concepts and texts. New forum topics will appear on Thursdays and will remain available until the following Wednesday at midnight. I will assess these responses for relevance, thoroughness and clarity, and I will send you a mid-session evaluation during Reading Week.

The essay, the annotated bibliography, and the children's book project must be submitted on their due date.. Assignments handed in on the following day will be graded without additional comments and will also lose 10% up to 11:59 p.m., when they will be REFUSED. If you need an extension, you must contact me by MONDAY of the week when the assignment is due. Computer failure is seldom an acceptable reason for granting an extension, and a conflict of deadlines is NEVER an acceptable reason. Written work must be typed in 12-pt Times New Roman, double spaced, and submitted with proper MLA documentation.

The Participation grade includes attendance but does not stop there; you also need to be on time, remain for the duration of the class, and contribute relevant comments aloud and/or in Chat. In addition, you will have read the books or articles assigned for the class and be able to respond to questions about them, and you will share in discussions in breakout rooms.

Students who do not complete all the required work should not expect to pass the course.

Student Responsibilities
