PREFACE: RESEARCHING THE NEEDS OF RURAL, REMOTE AND NORTHERN COMMUNITIES FROM WITHIN AT KEYANO COLLEGE

In 2024, Keyano College was awarded a \$750,000 Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council (NSERC) Mobilize grant to lead a multi-year research program focused on **Human Sustainability in the**North. This milestone marks a significant development in our institution's research journey and is a foundational element in shaping our broader strategic research direction.

As a community college proudly situated in the heart of the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo and on Treaty 8 territory, Keyano recognizes the unique role we play in supporting knowledge creation that is both relevant and rooted in place. Our strategic research plan reflects a deep commitment to engaging with the realities, needs, and strengths of rural, remote, and northern communities—not only through individual research projects, but through an institutional vision that values collaboration, reciprocity, and long-term impact.

The Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo is a complex and dynamic environment. Known internationally for the Athabasca oil sands, the region has also been shaped by population booms, climatedriven disasters, and ongoing shifts in infrastructure and industry. Residents here face a set of challenges—environmental, social, economic—that are often misunderstood or overlooked by researchers from outside the region.

This realization has strongly informed our strategic priorities. While the NSERC Human Sustainability in the North research program is just one example of our applied work, it reflects a broader commitment to reshaping how research is approached at Keyano College.

The award of the NSERC Mobilize grant marked a turning point—but it is not the whole story. It signaled that Keyano College is ready to lead research from within our own communities, and that we are committed to a new model: one that values equity, access, and collaboration.

Our strategic research plan builds on that momentum, expanding our capacity to generate knowledge that matters—here, in the North, and for the North.


VALUE 4: SUSTAINABILITY





- Why it matters: Health and well-being outcomes and quality of life in northern communities are shaped by low population density, distance from service centers, and limited infrastructure that has resulted in both systemic inequities and opportunities for innovation. This pillar centers community-driven approaches and recognizes the importance of northern-led research in achieving health and social equity.

They foster interdisciplinary collaboration, emphasizes real-world impact, and positions our research to contribute meaningfully to a sustainable future.

RESEARCH GOALS

Rooted in Northern Alberta and responsive to the unique needs of our communities, Keyano College's research goals are informed by our evolving research program focused on Human Sustainability in the North. Our strategy is to:

- Develop a sustainable Centre for Research and Innovation that supports faculty, students, industry, and community partners in building capacity and advancing research excellence in accordance with Tri-Council standards.
- 2. Enhance research capacity that supports student, faculty, and staff development as researchers.
- 3. Build a vibrant and inclusive College-wide research culture through ongoing training and development opportunities, supporting faculty, staff and students in engaging with applied research, discovery ("pure") research and the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL).
- Foster responsible community-based research aligned with the principles of Truth and Reconciliation and with Equity, Diversity, Inclusion (EDI), and ensuring research reflects the voices,

- lived experiences and priorities of Northern populations.
- Cultivate collaborative partnerships and knowledge sharing with local, regional, national and international partners to co-create solutions for social, cultural, political and economic challenges guided by respect and reciprocity.

Keyano's research efforts are grounded in quality, with a focus on meaningful knowledge mobilization and impact at the community, provincial, national, and international levels while ensuring that academic freedom, research integrity, and rigorous peer review remain central. They align with Keyano College's Strategic Plan and Academic Plan.





KEYANO COLLEGE STRATEGIC ACTIONS (2025–2030)

To achieve our research goals and contribute to the pillars and outcomes of Keyano College's 2025–2030 Strategic Plan, the following strategic actions will guide the implementation of the Research Strategic Plan:

1. Centre for Research and Innovation

- Increase the number of external research funding and diversify external research funding through grants, partnerships, and collaborative initiatives.
- Establish a Centre for Research and Innovation with dedicated staffing and operational capacity by 2030.
- Create a publicly accessible space for the
 Office of Research and Innovation to support
 community and industry engagement,
 interdisciplinary collaboration and knowledge
 sharing by 2026.

2. Enhance research capacity:

- Develop a Faculty and Student Training Plan by 2026 that includes:
 - Research ethics and integrity
 - OCAP® principles (Ownership, Control, Access, and Possession)
 - Applied research methodologies
 - Technology transfer and commercialization pathways

- Increase participation and skills in research by faculty, staff, and students across disciplines through targeted incentives, mentorship, and structured support by 2026.
- Develop a streamlined pathway for student research linked to program curriculum and foster opportunities for students to engage in research projects by 2030.
- Develop and implement robust infrastructure, resources, and standardized procedures to support the full lifecycle of research projects, including ethics, data management, reporting, and knowledge mobilization by 2026.
- Establish a Research Lab to support ongoing staff, student and course-based research by 2027.
- Launch an institutional repository to preserve and share Keyano's research outputs by 2026.

3. Build a vibrant and inclusive College-wide research culture

- Maintain a dynamic and strong online
 presence for the Centre for Research and
 Innovation, highlighting current projects,
 researchers, and events by 2026.
- Actively promote research
 accomplishments through conferences, media, internal communications, social platforms, and scholarly publications.
- Build internal recognition structures that celebrate excellence, innovation, and impactful research by 2026.
- Create a research communication strategy that includes external partners by 2027.

4. Foster responsible community-based research

- Signing and implementation of national and international pledges such as DORA and the Tri-Council Dimension Charter to commit to responsible research assessment and impact measurement by 2027.
- Create a Research Advisory Committee to support research endeavors at Keyano College by 2026.

5. Cultivate collaborative partnerships and knowledge sharing

- Align research efforts with communityidentified needs and emerging priorities related to human sustainability in northern communities by 2026.
- Identify and pursue strategic partnerships
 with local communities, Indigenous groups, and
 industry to co-develop and co-lead research
 projects by 2027.
- Integrating the Indigenous Advisory
 Committee in driving research in the region.
