CHSD 201 – Child Development II

3 Credits - 45 Hours

Course Description

The growth and development of the child from infancy through eight years of age is examined, with the emphasis on social, cognitive, and moral development. Keeping portfolio records of children's development and reflecting on case studies will facilitate the application of child development theory to practice.

Prerequisite: CHSD 101

Identify potential signs of mental health concerns in young children from middle childhood to adolescence.

Compile mental health support in the local community.

Organize strategies to maximize the inclusion and participation of children with exceptionalities.
